Skeptics Predictions for 1996

On 18 November 1995 the Phoenix Skeptics held their annual Predictions meeting at which the membership produced the following list of predictions for the following 14 months and beyond. In the Sixth year of our ongoing experiment in prognostication, we returned to a 60% plus hit rate (33 of 54 right for a hit rate of 61%, with two weeks remaining in the year at the time of this writing.)

Among our hits in 1995 was the death of Rose Kennedy, the scandal over Newt Gingrich's ethics violations, the entry of Steve Forbes into the Republican Presidential pack and the retention of Arizona's income tax for 1995.(Why would J. Our hit ratio continues to be higher than that of the professional psychics out there — which begs the questions: are their powers faulty, or are they just not reasonably well informed?
